I Survived

- by Allan Schutz



It was the 7th March 1993 when the clock in my prized Super V8 P76 stopped at 1.10 pm.

The previous week I had worked on my car, replacing the front struts with gas shockers using Commodore Tops, replaced the brake pads and balanced the tail-shaft. I also replaced the rear axle which included a Limited Slip Diff and finally resprayed underneath the vehicle with black super-coat ready for the National meeting to be held at Helensburgh (Sydney) 3 weeks later.

My journey was to include my late Dad's 80th birthday at Murray Bridge SA, where I was born and 2 weeks later back to Wagga for a RAAF Apprentice reunion, then onto Helensburgh at the end of the week.

It was after lunch on Saturday 6th Mar 93 before I left Ipswich after giving my 4 year old son Lewis, a ride around the block. He loved this car and he loved sitting in his car seat in the back, observing everything. My plan was to join my extended family for lunch the next day in SA to celebrate my dad's birthday.

I was pulled up by the police near Goondiwindi for speeding. I hopped out of the car and said "I had my head to the windscreen looking for Kangaroos, I realised my speed was creeping up at times but I was watching out, are there any around?". To my relief I received a warning. The boys at the next service station said no-one gets let off around here – must have been the Kangaroo story!

I drove all night sitting on 125kph, stopping for coffee many times to keep me awake. After a short rest at Hay around 10am the next morning, I became very tired but was running out of time, so kept going. It was not long before I was heading straight for an oncoming bus when my guardian angel aroused me but I continued on.

The fright I received from that experience did not last long and it happened again just before Balranald. I immediately stopped and went for a walk, considering how lucky that I awoke 2 times, heading into oncoming traffic with not much time to spare. I soon came by a Service Station where the road turned south to Victoria. I rested on the lawn but now being overtired I could not sleep.

I continued on for about an hour as the day was becoming very warm. It was almost 1pm (already late for lunch) when I stopped on the side of the road for a rest with the engine running and the air-conditioner on. Again I could not sleep and continued on.

About 10 minutes later exactly 5kms past the town of Piangil and heading towards Ouyen, I woke up when I hit a guide post on the wrong side of the road. The posts were about 1km apart and as I looked up I could see the broken post flying through the air - I had slumped into the middle of the car and my head was below the dashboard.

I sat up quickly and while trying to wake up I travelled some 35 meters, sideswiping trees before I got my senses. These tree branches badly dented the pillar beside my right shoulder and pierced the rear side window – That was my first miss.

I don't know why I did not think to brake as the car may have buried itself in the fine sand but I was concentrating on steering around a small bush and getting back up onto the road. I was absolutely flying, being off the road and it was like I was on ice with little control. I remember thinking HISTORY, meaning if I lost control getting back up to the road the car could have slid sideways with my door into the tree which stood about 8 meters high.

There was nowhere else to go and I knew I would have to get the car further to the right of the tree, to hit centre and the engine to take the brunt, otherwise due to the speed, the tree could have come right through to the cabin – head on.

Having lined the car up, I turned my left side forward and leaned into the centre of the car as I watched the tree travel up the centre of the bonnet in slow motion. – This saved me as I missed

the steering wheel. The seatbelt had released at the buckle after my chest took a hell of a hit and I slammed into the dashboard and back into the left hand door as the car tipped on its side. I thought 'oh my car' and during that split second as I travelled across the cabin, I had hit my head on the windscreen. I checked that my fingers and legs were moving and then blood everywhere. I could not see in a mirror or stop the bleeding, so I climbed out through the driver's window, walked along the side of the car and down onto the camper trailer. It was 10

minutes past 1 pm as I looked around with no-one in site.

I first checked the battery to make sure the positive terminal was not touching any metal – it missed by 2 cms, I have seen cars catch fire as a result of this. No fuel or gas leaks, so decided to take photos while I waited for someone to come along. The camera was down on the front passenger floor but I could not get in anywhere even though the laminated windscreen was badly damaged. I climbed back on top of the car and tried to lower myself through the driver's door but my chest would not



allow me to hold my body weight, so I climbed in and then out after retrieving my camera. I took about 20 photos and realised the whiplash caused the main trunk of the tree to snap about 2 meters up and the whole tree came crashing down – and missed me. It took just on 15 minutes for someone to pass by and before long there was a crowd. I remember one person knew my father from Murray Bridge.

The first person went on and notified the police and it was not to long before the police car arrived.

Policeman: "how did you get out of this"?

Me: "I walked out"

Policeman: shook his head and said "I will tell you this, if you were in a later model car you would not be standing there" He then said he would have to fine me \$135 for dangerous driving.

Me: "what for, I have just lost my car". **Policeman:** "How did this happen"?

Me: "I fell asleep" as I wondered if I had said the right thing. After I corrected what I said by saying I think I fell asleep but was going to go back down the road to see if I may have lost control of the car in the gravel. With that we hopped in the police car and went back some distance but there was no indication that I lost control. We got on well during the hour or two to follow, as he organized a tow truck to first take away my camper trailer and then the car. There was only a couple of items that detached from the car and after the car was pulled back onto its wheels and everything was cleared from the site we noticed the left hand front light surround, some 12 meters further on, lying in the grass. He said "now look here", for that to pluck off the car and finish that far ahead of the car you would have to be travelling 140kph. I denied this because it all happened in my estimate of 3 seconds over 70 meters and that equals 100kph. He then suggested that in some instances when you fall asleep your foot is relaxed and becomes heavier on the accelerator and you go faster and faster. I later proved this was possible. His departing words were "about that fine, I will see what we can do". I thanked him and took a ride to Swan Hill Hospital with the tow truck driver and my beautiful smashed up car onboard. I never heard anymore about the fine but some years later the policeman was in training at Melbourne RMIT where my Air-force mate (best man at my wedding) was the instructor and this policeman was telling the whole class about this accident that he attended.

The most interesting things as result of this accident.

The car held together in one piece and the bonnet crumpled in the places it was designed to do. The bonnet however flew up as the two prongs at the rear of the bonnet and just in front of the windscreen, missed engaging in the rings. The laminated windscreen was my saviour. The tree had travelled halfway to the windscreen and if it were not for an extra heavy stabilizer bar that I had installed on the front suspension, how much further would the tree have travelled? The stabilizer bar, made of spring steel, (normally does not bend) was over 25mm thick and finished up with almost a 90 degree bend in the middle.

The front of the engine was crushed as it was almost pushed out under the car. While the roof buckled on both sides, all of the doors had moved rearwards with only the left rear door being stiff, but able to close.

The outside runners on each of the front seats released, resulting in the seats being twisted. The Dashboard remained dead straight across the cabin but as the engine rammed into the firewall the dash bowed up in the middle as the floor bowed down in the middle. The large tunnel in the centre of the floor prevented the cabin closing in on me – a good design feature. The tail-shaft was straight however the rear axle bent into a "V" shape which makes one question how my body survived this hit.

The tow ball fitting on the camper was broken off as it stripped the tow bar clean off the car, wrapping it up like a piece of string and tore a hole through the floor of the boot just short of the gas tank.

The only other damage to the camper was the left wheel. Now this was the most interesting thing because it later took 4 men with a long lever to straighten the bent axle. The axle had bent at the inner wheel bearing and so the wheel was at quite an angle when it should have been straight up. It is hard to believe that this wheel spun dead true, it did not buckle but yet the axle was bent. – a lot of energy in a spinning wheel.

I was hospitalised overnight and initially they were not sure if my left leg was broken as a result of the dent in the lower parcel tray under the steering wheel – made of steel. I never suffered any shock or pain whatsoever.

My injuries

- A minor fracture to my right hand little finger.
- -- 7 stitches to my head.
- A severe blow to my left leg below the knee severed the main artery and my leg blew up like a balloon.
- -- While my chest took a big hit initially from the seatbelt, I always wondered why I never bruised. 9 years later I had to have my thymus gland removed because it had enlarged and was crushing my heart and lungs I believe this could have been a result of this accident. I was super fit after having spent 5 months building a brick garage big enough to fit 5 Leyland P76's. The next day I hopped on a bus to arrive home with my Dad a day late.

I returned to the accident scene 15 years later and was amazed at what I saw.
